Faith Holly Hall believes she came into this life with a sense of caring and the need to be a helper. "Both my parents were blind so my older brother and I had to shoulder responsibilities at an early age," she recalls. "At four I was the one feeding my little brother who had a muscle disorder and could not feed himself."

Her family's extraordinary life was the subject of a book, "What Love Sees" and a CBS television movie. It is the tale of two persons who lose their sight, one at 12 and the other in his late teens. They fall in love and build a remarkable life together with their four children.

In spite of being blind, her parents were rather strict and particular about how the children looked. Her mom did not want her little girl to wear pink for example because she didn't think that color was right for a red head.

Faith is one of the Village's many California natives. She earned a degree in Music from Occidental College in L.A. and as a young bride moved to Corvallis. After moving to Tumalo with her husband and two children, she taught the Yamaha music method to young children.

But the desire to be of service was ingrained in Faith. Brought up in a Christian Science tradition, she spent many years as a Christian Science healer. "I was guided by Oneness, Unconditional love and Compassion," she says.

Seeking a broader vision she attended a two-year program to become an Interfaith Spiritual Companion, learning of the many faith traditions that abound in our world.

Spiritual Companions spend time with other persons helping them on their life's journey as they find their own truth," she explains. "My role is to listen and allow the person to explore within the context of their own faith or belief system."

A woman of many talents, her interests took a turn when admiring a friend's watercolor, she was encouraged to take a class and try her own hand at painting.

I was stunned at my own ability," she says. Portraits are her favorite subject. She has had exhibits in Bend galleries over the years.

Widowed several years ago, she swapped houses with her daughter and is in a cozy little place in Bend.

Faith volunteered for 16 months doing all the shopping and errands for a housebound friend. As a Village member Faith hopes to offer her listening skills to help give a care-giving spouse some time off or help someone losing his or her sight or other life challenges.

Multi-Cancer Early Detection (MCED) Tests

There is a great public health need to identify potentially lethal cancers at earlier stages, when there is a greater chance of cure, often with less treatment related morbidity. In the U.S., where cancer is the second leading cause of death, there are currently screening recommendations for only five cancer types; breast, colorectal, cervical, lung, and prostate. However, about 70 percent of all cancer deaths come from cancers for which there are no proven screening tests.

The new MCED tests, which can screen for up to fifty cancers simultaneously based on a simple venous blood draw or "liquid biopsy." It can, if a positive "signal" is found, direct further, though sometimes costly, testing which can often confirm the presence of cancer. There are currently at least nine test developers in the global MCED test market vying for market share, but none has yet received a positive recommendation by the U.S. Preventative Services Task Force (USPSTF) or approval by the FDA, a requirement for Medicare reimbursement.

A large (140,000 individuals) randomized controlled trial of one of these tests (the Galleri test) as a supplement to usual cancer screening is in progress in the U.K. Hopefully the results of this study, along with results of other studies in progress or being planned, will help guide the USPSTF and the FDA in answering whether this new technology will reduce cancer deaths and thereby warrant approval.
